“The Creation of the DFA in 2002”



The first gathering of the DFA in 2002 came about because a lot of Dillman researchers that were building their family trees but weren't sure where they fit in the Dillman “forest” of names and places! The advent of the Internet made us aware of large numbers of Dillmans from both the past and the present, many of whom were attached to various families but not necessarily to the others.

It was suggested that some type of gathering be held to see if we could sort out the Dillmans we were aware of and attach them to their respective trees. Perhaps, we would also discover and meet some new cousins. However, it was hoped that the gathering wouldn't be a typical “Hot Dog and Beer” or “T-Shirt” type of family reunion. Indianapolis, IN seemed to be a good choice as it was centrally located in the U. S. and was close to a major airport.

The gathering took place during August 2002. With close to 80 in attendance, we felt that this style of gathering could become a regular event.

A business meeting was held to discuss what we hoped to accomplish with this gathering and, after a couple of genealogical presentations and the discovery that not all Dillmans are related to each other, our name, the Dillman Family Association, was chosen with plans to meet two years later.

One of the proposals made in 2002 was to consider the creation of a DNA project to help sort out all of the

Dillmans. Frank Dillman from Notasulga, AL offered to research what was involved in such a project and to contact us after the gathering with his findings. It turned out that the project would be relatively easy for the participants but a job for Frank to create and maintain the online chart (For more information regarding the Dillman DNA Project, please read the next article). In a nutshell, the project has helped the DFA in numerous ways.

Since its inception, the DFA has maintained the schedule of meeting every two years. In 2004, we met near Cincinnati, OH (Northern Kentucky near the Cincinnati Airport, to be exact) as it was centrally located and many Dillman families had lived at some point in parts of Ohio and some still do.

In 2006, we chose Harrisburg, PA because many of the Dillman families lived in areas of Pennsylvania and, again, many still do. That location allowed a number of Dillmans from that region to attend the gathering and to share their family histories with us.

With the two previous Mega-Reunions each having fewer attendees, we felt that we should once again meet in Indianapolis, IN. While the number this year was still around forty, we had a considerable number of new attendees including those who traveled from the Provinces of Ontario and Alberta, Canada

“Dillman DNA Project”

During the first Dillman Mega-Reunion in 2002, many of the attendees felt that a DNA project for all Dillmans would benefit the DFA by sorting and/or attaching the various participants to the groups of Dillmans that we were aware of at that time. Frank Dillman from Alabama learned what was necessary to start such a project and set us up with FTDNA, a DNA testing firm for the purpose of genealogy research. Several of us, who are direct male-line

descendants of a Dillman, sent for the package and used the enclosed plastic brush on the inside of our cheeks and sent in the scraped tissue to be tested.

Once Frank received the DNA markers for the first few participants, he created a chart to show the numbers of DNA markers and had it posted on his personal website. Some of us were trying to guess who was related to who before the results came back. Needless to say, there were many surprises.

Dillman Genealogical DNA Project

Frank Dillman, Administrator

The results posted on the chart showed each participant’s assigned number (to protect their privacy) followed by the DNA marker numbers, the earliest known ancestor of each

participant and, if known, their Haplogroup (a lineage cluster, often identified by that group’s migration dating back thousands of years).

As more results came in, a background color was assigned to each group of related participants. A few of us knew each other's assigned numbers and found that many of our earlier guesses were way off! Even more surprising was the fact that FTDNA alerted us to a participant in their overall study that matched one of our groups, but, his last name was Stillman! Once that was discovered, discussions were had, paperwork was combed through thoroughly and, in the end, we learned that Georg Adam Dillmann, who was presumed killed in the Revolutionary War, was actually taken prisoner by the British Army, taken to Nova Scotia, Canada, and was mustered into the British Army. When he was mustered out, his last name somehow became Stillman and, except for a couple of exceptions, it remained Stillman! His discovery also revealed for some DFA members that they were descended from Hans Georg Dillmann and his wife, Margaretha Murr, who emigrated to North America from Neureut, Baden, Germany to Philadelphia, PA on the ship "Brothers."

Besides Dillman and Stillman, other surnames in our project include Tillman, Tilghman, Dillmann, Diellman and Dhyllmann. Most of these ancestors originally lived in Germany/Prussia where the letters "D" and "T" were often interchangeable.

Because of the DNA project, we have learned that, so far, there are 10 groups of Dillman families that are not related to each other unless you go back tens of thousands of years. If you are researching your family genealogy and haven't yet discovered which group you might connect to, please consider joining the Dillman DNA project where you might connect with one of the current groups or you just might provide us with yet another new group for this ever-growing and ever-changing, very exciting study.

“Recap of the Dillman Mega-Reunion #4”

The general consensus is that each of our biennial mega-reunions is better than the previous! Part of this greater enjoyment is due to how knowledgeable we have all become in the various aspects of our own families, the families of the other groups, and the way the Dillman DNA project identified the different groups as well as connecting us to cousins that we weren't aware of. We are able to assist the newcomers quickly and share with them what we know about their particular group.

This year, Don Dillman felt that it was time to create a document stating the goals and purposes of our organization. We discussed and revised the first and second drafts and came up with a set of guidelines that everyone could agree on and was approved unanimously by those present in our DFA meeting. This will soon be posted at the DFA webpage dillmanfamilyassociation.org.

Another discussion considered the practicality of the group filing for non-profit status but it was deemed unnecessary for our relatively small group and limited expenses. The DFA is supported solely by membership dues, reunion registration fees and donations for CDs and other information produced by the DFA.

It was felt that we could increase awareness of the DFA and improve communications of our activities and benefits through the publication of a newsletter. We decided that a quarterly newsletter would work and Phil Dillman (me) was willing to get the project rolling.

Also at the business meeting, we elected officers for the next two years.

They include Don Dillman - President (dillman@turbonet.com), Andrew Stillman - Vice-President, Chris Dillman - Secretary, Earl Dillman - Treasurer, and Chuck Dillman continues on the DFA council as immediate past President.

At this time, the location for the 2010 Mega-Reunion is yet to be decided. We had several suggested sites and had a vote for each one. It was narrowed down to two locations for further investigation with the final decision to be announced in a future newsletter.

As for the facility, the folks at the Wingate-Airport in Indianapolis could not have been nicer or more helpful. They kept the coffee and water filled. 6. “2009 Mini Reunion in Germany”

Following up on a suggestion from the 2008 Mega Reunion, the planning has begun for a trip to Germany to visit the locations of origin of several of our group's Dillman ancestors. The proposed dates are Sept 30, 2009 - Oct. 13, 2009 and will include visits to Bad Schwalbach (Hesse, Germany), Lautzenhausen (Rhineland-Pfalz, Germany), Lembach (Alsace, France), Wurmberg, Neureut, Pforzheim (Baden-Wurtemberg, Germany). We aim to meet as many local Dillman's as possible on this trip to collect family stories, genealogies and potentially find European participants for the DNA project. Time permitting, we may be able to take in some sights such as Koblenz or Heidelberg.

Each participant is responsible for their airfare to and from Frankfurt and the journey will begin with an overnight stay in Frankfurt on Oct. 1st. Local ground transportation, accommodations, and itinerary would be arranged and prices for these are to be determined. As this time of year is a busy, arrangements will need to be finalized not later than June 2009. At this point, an **expression of interest only** is required to assist in determining adequate lodging for the group.

“Family History Interest...by Default!”

The genealogy bug was always lurking around my family. In fact, we seemed to have a colony of genealogy bugs on both sides of the family! Eventually, I was bitten by the bug in a big way! However, it was slow in catching up to me.

Family gatherings were always a part of life in my youth. In fact, there are pictures of me as a child at numerous family get-togethers when I was still too young to read. My parents, on the other hand, were always soaking up the stories told by the older relatives and visiting all of the family members was simply a part of life.

When I was in junior high school, I had very little interest in any of my classes. This was especially true in my U. S. History class in which one of the assignments was to write out your family tree and tell what you could about the people in the tree. I knew very little about my family history. I told my folks about the assignment and my mother was excited about it. My mother started writing down everything she could remember about the various ancestors and began asking for information from all of the relatives she could think of. Eventually, it reached the point where finding information farther back than anyone in the family could remember would require a trip to downtown Chicago to the Newberry Library, a goldmine of genealogical information.

My mother, father, sister and I traveled to the city and went inside the library. Unfortunately, to enter the library, you had to be 16 years old and up. Both my sister and I were under the

age of 16 so, while my parents were inside researching our family tree for my project, my sister and I had to entertain ourselves out in the lobby of the place! I don't remember what grade I received for my parents' project.

Years later, the bug had bitten me. I had an interest in the family which was strengthened by those constant family gatherings. My dad's sister was also interested in genealogy and shared what she knew with me.

In 1998, I purchased a computer and found the Family Tree Maker software by Broderbund. I gathered up all of the notes that my parents had written over the years from their conversations with all of those older family members and started entering the information into the computer. Once I exhausted that resource, I discovered several websites such as Genforum and discovered a boatload of information about all sorts of Dillmans. ***Imagine! All of those relatives!*** Eventually, I learned that they weren't all related to me but they all had the desire to learn more about their families. Through a number of e-mails, I suggested that maybe some type of gathering could be held to see if we could sort out the Dillmans we were aware of and attach them to their respective trees... ***Wait a minute! I've just come full circle!***

The bottom line is that I'm hooked on genealogy and am not likely to give it up. Ever! It's too much fun and a great challenge. It's a never-ending puzzle with still more pieces to be discovered and added. I hope you feel the same way about your research.

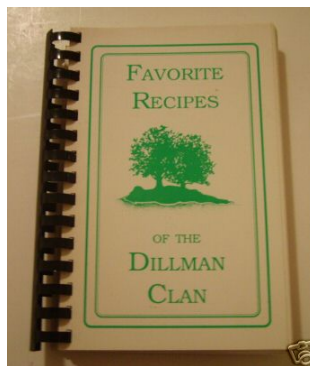
