| Immigrating Ancestor | Numerous (144 immigrants) |
| Alternate names | Dielemans of the Netherlands and Belgium |
| Date of Immigration | Various, earliest appears to be 1847 |
| Description | <p>With 144 immigrating individuals, this is by far the most prolific family in terms of migration. Remarkably for the most part, they can be readily traced back to 1 individual, Petrus Dieleman who lived in East Flanders, Belgium in the 15th/16th Century. Petrus' 3x great-grandson made his way to the Netherlands (Francois Dieleman) where he died in Hoek, the Netherlands and was the progenitor of the Netherlands branch of the family.
