Description	George Adam Dillmann was born in Neureut, Baden, Germany and at the age of 2 sailed with his parents from Rotterdam, Netherlands for Philadelphia on the ship Brother. They farmed in Bethel Township, Berks County, Pennsylvania. George and brother Andreas enlisted in the Pennsylvania Rifles on 9 Apr 1776 at Lancaster, PA. They fought at the Battle of Long Island on 27 Aug 1776 and he was listed as being missing after the battle. He next appears, as George Dillman, on a list of 130 prisoners taken by the British after the battle and were sworn into the 2 nd Battalion of the 84 Regiment on 3 Sep 1776. They were taken to Halifax and George was placed in the 7 th Company. He was listed in a muster in Halifax in May 1778. George Stillman was mustered out of the 5 th Company on 10 Oct 1783 at Fort Edward, Windsor, Nova Scotia. His first land deed was dated 1 Oct 1788 at Parrsborough, Nova Scotia, across the Minas Basin from Windsor. His first child, Edward, (born in Eastport, Maine) was baptised on 8 Jun 1788 at St. George's Anglican Church, Parrsborough, Nova Scotia. Land sales deeds (1821, 1832, 1833) between him and his sons use Dillman/Stillman interchangeably. His daughter, Nancy was noted as Nancy Dillman in her 1812 marriage to Robert Henwood.
