Date of Immigration	According to the 1910 US Census for Pennsylvania, Enoch arrived in the US in 1887.
Description	<p>This was a family from the north of England from a mining community who sought a better life and work in the coal mines in Pennsylvania.</p> <p>Enoch's father, Henry, fought in the Crimean War and his mother Priscilla Underwood died (1858) at Camp Aldershot where families of serving soldiers were housed, while his father was away. His father and 2 brothers were admitted to a workhouse in London (St. Pancras) and discharged in 1861.</p> <p>Henry's prior history is not clear but given his presence in the south of England, he may have originated in Cornwall, where many Delmer's resided and worked in the mining operations there.</p>
Facts	<p>According to his death certificate, Enoch was born 10 May 1856 and died on 9 Apr 1926.</p> <p>According to the England and Wales Civil registration Marriage Index, Enoch and Mary McCabe were married in Q4 1876 in Durham, England.</p> <p>US Mining Accidents records note that Enoch was thrown from a derailed cardropping car at the mine site in Nantyglo, Cambria, Pennsylvania on 8 Sep 1923, which was non-fatal.</p>
